


















The San Francisco Bay Delta Estuary is

- Largest estuary on the west coast of Americas
 - 1600 sq mi of water- drains 40% state
 - Highly valued resource
 - Drinking water for 23M people
 - Irrigates 4.5M ac farmland
 - GDP \$535B 19th in World [if a nation]
 - Highest patent generation in US
- Rich fish & wildlife habitat
- Highly urbanized 12-county region




The Comprehensive Conservation & Management Plan: CCMP




Dynamic equilibrium as grants/projects wrap up and new ones come online



Total Current Funds Managed






What happened? IRWM

- Integrated Regional Water Management
- ABAG/SFEP grantee for all IRWM projects in SF Bay region:
 - Round 2 (2014): \$20M
 - Round 3 (2015): \$32.2M
 - Round 4 (expected 2016): \$41.3M
 - Total: \$93.5M



This FFY Budget Estimate: \$22.5M



- IRWM project funds managed for partners

Leverage

- Recently reported to NEPORT the FY 14-15 totals
- Leveraged \$38.5M






Trash Capture Demonstration Project

- 2009-2013
- \$5 million in federal stimulus and CA bond funds
- 65 participating municipalities
- 12 vendors under contract
- 4003 devices installed




What did we learn?

- Designs for So. CA needed redesign
- Most holding up
- Vendors honoring warranties
- Many munis installed curb screens (ARS) in combo with inserts to reduce maintenance
- 5 mm standard is challenge for nets in lg. devices
- Over 10-20 years, costs lower for large over small devices






Keys to success?


