

Issue Paper Development Timeline

Background Research

Council staff review agency precedents, meet with agency, NGO, and EJ organization staff, and conduct a literature review.

EJ Lunchtime Series

The Council hosts a 4-part virtual brown bag series with presentations by EJ scholars.

Public Comment Analysis

Public comment analysis is completed.

EJ Interviews

Council staff conduct 22 interviews with community EJ advocates and present results to the Council.

Public Outreach & Engagement

Council staff attend various community events and hear from community members about EJ issues impacting them.

What is a community-based organization? What is an EJ community?

EJ Expert Group creation

- Goal: build relationships with CBOs
- >60 orgs and >100 Tribes
- Diverse expertise and geographical coverage in and around the Delta
- Kickoff call ~ 20 participants
- Contracted with 4 organizations

Interviews

- Goal: Legitimize voices of EJ communities
- Initial list research and contacts > 60
- Purposive sampling: representation of wide array of issues and geographies
- Snowball sampling followed based on interviewee references

Tribal Engagement

- Outreach to tribes for Expert Group and interviews
- Pre-Consultation with 4 tribes
- Council tribal listening session April 2023
- Participation in events with a tribal focus
- Consultation and tribal roundtable
 October 15th






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

Procedural justice: fairness, transparency & accessibility of decision-making processes

Representational justice: representation in decision-making processes

"Meet people where they are.
Address immediate issues

Tribal Justice Issues

Recognitional/Representational:

Lack of recognition
 of tribal sovereignty, preservation,
 and Traditional Knowledge

Procedural:

 Marginalization and exclusion from decisionmaking processes and inadequate Tribal Consultation

Distributive:

 Disproportionate exposure to environmental hazards- water contamination, heat, air and noise pollution

Water, Flood Risk, and Climate Change

Water:


- Water rights priority system
- Water conveyance
- Harmful algal blooms; pollution and industrial contaminants
- Water affordability

Flood Risk

 Allocations of levee investments, flood insurance access and affordability, and land use planning

Climate Change:

 Some communities disproportionately vulnerable to climate hazards (floods, extreme heat events, droughts, etc.)



Water systems failing and at risk of failing human right to water standards. Data from SWRCB, 2024.


Pollution Exposure, Public Health, and Recreation/Outdoor Access

Pollution exposure & public health:

- Historic redlining and present-day land use planning result in disproportionate exposure to environmental hazards
- Long-term, generational health impacts due to pollution exposure, lack of access to health services, public transport, & healthy food

Recreation & outdoor/greenspace access:

- Inequitable access
- Higher air temperatures, lower air quality

CalEPA, Pollution and Prejudice

Food security, housing, and the unhoused

Housing and the unhoused:

- Unaffordable housing and necessities
- Lack of sanitation resources lead to health hazards for unhoused neighbors
- Encampments near levees pose safety risk from flood risk

Food security and access:

- High rates of food insecurity in most Delta counties
- Inability to engage in subsistence activities
- Inadequate access to stores selling healthy foods

The Delta Residents Survey found that approximately 1/4 of Delta residents report household incomes of \$50,000 annually or lower and report affordability of basic needs (housing, food, utilities, transportation) to be a key challenge to their well-being (Rudnick et al., 2023).






